In seminar, we will read Aeschylus' *Prometheus Bound*, which dramatizes the origin of human knowing and striving. The first chapters of Genesis depict the beginning of the world, human beings, and transgressions. In the Zhuangzi, we will see that greater understanding results from balancing different perspectives. In math, we'll study the first principles of Euclidian geometry, perhaps the real beginning of human understanding. In language, our readings will address the unending human yearning to grasp our origins.

How can one know oneself? What is the self? In seminar, we will read Plato's *Apology* in which Socrates implores the Athenians to gain self-knowledge. Epictetus' *Enchiridion* explores how beliefs affect emotions and perception. In the *Katha Upanishad*, we see how a young Naciketas bargins with Yama, Death, and manages to gain self-knowledge. In language, we will read poets' beautiful and sublime treatments of our theme. Music classes will focus on Beethoven's Eroica, perhaps the greatest piece of self-exploration.

Deposit and Payment

A \$200 deposit is required by June 1, 2017 to secure your place in the session(s) you wish to attend. If you are attending multiple sessions on one campus, a single \$200 deposit is all that's needed. If attending sessions on both campuses, deposits must be submitted to each location.

Summer Academy tuition is \$1,100 per week if the deposit is received by June 1. After that, tuition is \$1,250 per week. Tuition covers room, meals, books, activity fees, and cool St. John's swag.

Is there homework?

Ideally, students should read the material texts before they arrive on campus - this allows for the opportunity to revisit and review material prior to classes. It also gives you something immediately in common with other students to help strike up a conversation!

How do you apply?

The process is easy. Fill out the application form (to come), tell us why you would like to attend the Summer Academy, and submit an unofficial transcript. Because it's an

unofficial transcript, you do not have to send it through your school's counseling office - a

scan or screenshot of your most recent grade summary will work.

Who are the RAs? What kind of training do they get?

Summer Academy Resident Assistants are undergraduates at St. John's College who are chosen through a competitive interview process. Each is background checked; is CPR and First Aid certified, and participated in a weeklong, mandatory training prior to the start of Summer Academy. Many are experienced, having served as an RA during the school year.
